



TAKE ME OUT TO SAN QUENTIN



There are always a lot of baseball trips that the Hoop Historians take each year, but **Pat Irvine** and **John Mayberry** made a unique excursion

this summer when they attended a baseball game in San Quentin Prison. Pat threw out the opening pitch and in perfect style of her brother, former MLB Manager Billy Martin, kicked dirt on the umpire to the delight of the inmates. While many penitentiaries around the country have organized baseball teams, San Quentin's is the oldest and one of the only ones that competes against outside ball clubs. The ballpark is in the middle of the prison compound and has been there for over 100 years and gives those that are incarcerated an opportunity to still play the game. Irvine, who was the only woman in the facility, thought it was an awesome experience, "It was almost like being in a movie. The prisoners were very nice. They told me their story and how it was their fault that they were in here. I was not uncomfortable for one moment. For prisoners they were pretty darn nice". Coach Mayberry noted that Pat and himself were the only two people allowed to sit during the game. The San Quentin Baseball Team played two games that day, tying the visiting Santa Monica Suns in the first game 7-7 and then dropping the nightcap 7-6.
