### EARLY ROUND SITES NAMED FOR FUTURE NCAA TOURNAMENTS

Twenty-four cities have been named to host first, second and regional round games of upcoming NCAA basketball tournaments in 2009 and 2010. Cities hosting first weekend action in 2009 include: Davton. Greensboro, Kansas City, Miami, Minneapolis, Philadelphia, Portland and Spokane. 2009 Regionals will be Glendale, played at: Boston, Indianapolis and Memphis. Games at Cardinal Stadium at the Glendale, Arizona site open up the possibility of a future Final Four returning West of the Rocky Mountains for the first time since 1995, as sites interested in hosting the Final Four must host an earlier Regional. First and Second round games in 2010 will be played Boise. Buffalo. Jacksonville. at: Milwaukee, New Orleans, Oklahoma City, Providence and San Jose. Regionals for 2010 are slated for Houston, Saint Louis, Salt Lake City and Syracuse. 

### LEGENDARY BIG MAN GEORGE MIKAN RECOGNIZED



The late George Mikan, voted as the NBA's greatest player of the first half of the century who revolutionized the big man in the game of basketball, was recently remembered with a lifesized statue which is located in his hometown of Joliet, Illinois on the appropriately named George Mikan Boulevard. The 6'10" Gentle Giant starred at DePaul University and became such a force inside that the NCAA instituted a goaltending rule in the mid-1940's. He was a three time college All-American and would later go on to lead the NBA in scoring from 1946-52. Mikan died in 2005. The dedication was attended by Bernie Skul, a former DePaul basketball player in addition to being a Joliet native - and long-time Friend of the Hoop Historians
