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VETS GET TO VISIT WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL

Those that served our country during World War II are being recognized through the Honor Flight program



which takes veterans to the World War II Memorial in Washington DC. Friend of the Hoop Historians, John McCann, went on the trip to the nation's capitol. John, who served in the Navy in World War II, is the father of Hoop Historian Kevin McCann. The National World War II Memorial commemorates the 16 million who served in the U.S. Armed Forces. the more than 400,000 who died. and the millions who supported the war effort at home. In addition to his service to his country, John also served DePaul University as its Sports Information Director from 1958 to 1973 and was the recipient of the school's Dr. Robert Hamilton Special Service Award in 2004.

In 1980 Doug got a ticket from Coach Frank McGuire, and in 1982 Foley and enjoyed a Final Four breakfast conversation with the entertaining John Wooden, where Coach told stories for about 45 minutes. Of course, besides growing up in the basketball country of Indiana, Doug attended the University of Kentucky - another basketball powerhouse - and worked the Wildcats basketball camp from 1980-83. Doug always enjoys when his alma mater is in the title game. Currently Foley is employed in the aviation field and sells charter and fractional shares of aircraft. He resides in suburban Indianapolis and, of course, has rooted for local hometown team Butler in the last two national championship games. In April of this past year Doug was inducted into the Hoop Historians as a full member.

CITY OF NEW ORLEANS: BACK ON THE REBOUND

Most of the Hoop Historians haven't been back to the Crescent City since the Final Four last played there in 2003.
